Bethel's 97th Annual Chicken Dinner/Fall Craft Boutique Returns Saturday, Sept. 16

Bethel's famous Fried Chicken Dinner will be celebrating its 97th year on Saturday, Sept.16, and Bethel members and friends are reminded to invite everyone to come and enjoy this special day. Dinners will be served from 2 until 7 p.m.in the church Fellowship Hall, with both dining in and carry-out meals. The dinner includes fried chicken, German potato salad, coleslaw, green beans, applesauce and dessert. Plates for adults will be \$15, for children (ages 6 through 10) plates will be \$10. Dinners for children under the age of 5 years are free.

The Bethel Crafters will host their popular Fall and Christmas Boutique, featuring their beautiful handmade items. It will be open throughout the dinner hours. There will also be bakery goods for sale, along with their beautiful handmade items.

The Chicken Dinner co-chairmen Carla Desalme and Nina Lantz

will be sending out work assignment letters to Bethel members. The day goes smoothly with everyone working together. Assignments will include setting up tables in Fellowship Hall, food preparation and cooking, serving in the dining room, taking tickets, manning take-out orders and clean-up.

Bethel members provide desserts for the meal. The dessert choices include pies, cakes, muffins and brownies or cookies. Coffee, lemonade and ice tea will be served in the dining room. Each member also is asked to donate \$5 to give the dinner committee a head start on dinner supplies. If anyone cannot make it to their assignment, just call Nina or Carla or the church. But remember, most of all, to spread the word about our Chicken Dinner and consider taking a meal to someone you know who is a shut-in and cannot attend. This is truly a wonderful old-fashioned church dinner, and a delicious meal!

CHICKEN SUPPER GROCERY SHOPPING WITH NINA AND CARLA

As far back as anyone remembers a certain large red potato has been purchased for Bethel's famous potato salad. The right kind is found at Soulard Market located just a hop, skip and jump from the Missouri River in downtown St. Louis city. "No one knows exactly why, but that's what *the recipe* calls for," Nina laughs. It takes 200 pounds of potatoes which are packed in four boxes of 50 pounds each. "As you know, the cooking of the potatoes starts at 1a.m. Potatoes are sorted for size and placed in pots accordingly so they cook evenly. When we assemble at 6 a.m. the potato skins are removed and the potatoes cut.



The internet offers a clue to why the red potato may have been designated. The red potato is especially rich in anti-toxins and anti-inflammatory and has more potassium than a banana. They are low in fat and sodium and are cholesterol-free. However, it is more likely the red potato was chosen because of its less starchy texture. It is more "waxy" and holds

together better.



<u>Timing and Freshness Top Priority.</u> This year, the 12 dozen eggs needed will be purchased from a local farmer. Freshness and getting things assembled as close to their use is a priority. The 21 pounds of bacon required will also be brought in the week of the event. The huge cans of green beans and apple sauce will be brought in the week before, purchased from a long-time source that delivers reliable good quality. No one is forgetting the fried chicken, of course, and even in mid-August before the Sept. 16 event, it is at the top of the list! The foregoing barely touches the surface of all the things that must be done, and so we thank Nina and Carla a bunch!!!

Letter going out. Each Bethel family is asked to contribute \$5 to get the shopping ball rolling. And don't forget the pies. That is a special yearly event for Bethel's famous bakers and a really wonderful addition to the menu. Beverages and dessert are all in the price of the ticket, not an add-on! The letter will have suggested work assignments and all hands are welcome Nina and Carla say.

Abigail Reed, Skidmore College in NY (Daughter of Dale and Carolyn Reed—who were in church to receive the award check); Dylan Howard, Missouri State University (Grandson of Diane Smith); Ashley Queen, St. Louis Community College in Wildwood (Granddaughter of Pam Queen) and Evan Guentz, Kennesaw University, in GA (Grandson of Ron Guentz) is the new awardee for 2023-2024.



The initial gift from the Schalks was never to fall below the initial amount and was to be invested and carefully stewarded. Kudos go to Bert Foster who has managed this year along with a decision of the Board to increase the stipend to \$750. It was also decided to add a trade school option along with college or university. More than money, our church wants each of you students to know we are pulling for you and wishing you the best!


This past June, I had the good fortune of traveling to Israel with Christ for the Nations, a 75-year-old bible school in Dallas, Texas. Among the many adventures I enjoyed, was being rebaptized in the Jordan River. The opportunity to be rebaptized where Jesus was baptized by John the Baptist, was too exciting to pass up.

On the cross, Jesus experienced death, burial, and resurrection for all of us. Water baptism by submersion, provides an identity with the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus. In 2 Corinthians 5:17, Paul writes: if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature. Old things are washed away, all things become new.

Historically besides the Jordan River being the very river where Jesus was baptized, it is also the river the Israelites crossed to enter the Promised Land. And a miracle between Elijah and Elisha also took place on the Jordan River. According to 2 Kings 2:8-11, Elijah folded his mantle together, struck the water, and it divided so he and Elisha could cross over to the other side of the river. Elijah was also taken in a whirlwind to heaven from this place. So, the river has special meaning to both Jews and Christians for the miracles God performed at this river.



Geographically, the Jordan River is connected to the Sea of Galilee and ends in the Dead Sea.

SEPTEMBER 11 ANNIVERSARY REMINDS AMERICANS TO HONOR OUR VETERANS AND OUR FLAG

The anniversary of the Sept. 11 terror attack on our country is a date that Americans remember with grief and reverence. It still seems impossible that people could mastermind such an attack on the United States of America.

But, we must never forget. The date should remind us to honor our veterans, and to show respect for our flag. The flag of the United States was created in 1777, when on June 14 the Continental Congress adopted the stars and stripes design as the official flag of our nation. This is why June 14 is known as Flag Day.

According to legend, it was a group headed by George Washington who commissioned Betsey Ross, a Philadelphia seamstress, to create the flag. The design includes 13 stripes of red and white, and a blue field with 13 white stars. The stars represented the 13 colonies, and they were arranged in a circle. As more states were added to the union, the flag was revised to include more stars.

The U.S. flag is flown from sunrise to sunset, and should be taken down during inclement weather. It is flown 24 hours a day at the White House and at several military institutions. It was flown in space in July, 1969, when astronaut Neil Armstrong placed the flag on the moon. It was placed on the moon six times when our Apollo program returned men to the lunar surface.



When and How Should a Flag Be Retired?

There is a protocol for the retirement of a U.S. flag when it shows wear and tear with fading and fraying. It is then considered no longer fitting to display. The Boy Scouts of America and the American Legion can guide anyone who has a flag to be retired, or they can retire it for you.

A dignified ceremony is suggested that should include saluting the flag, and reciting the Pledge of Allegiance followed by a moment of silence. The flag can be retired by burning or by burying it.

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
