NEW YEAR BRINGS NEW OPPORTUNITIES TO SERVE OTHERS

The new year is the best time to set goals, and Bethel plans to start the year with a list of goals for serving others. This is our Mission Calendar 2024.

As an independent church, Bethel has the freedom to choose the Mission projects we want to support.



Each month we will focus on a specific charity or organization. Some of them are organizations that we have worked with in the past. Some are new groups that Bethel members have suggested.

On the first Sunday of each month, aligning with Communion Sunday, we will announce our Mission for the Month, and encourage members to participate. All who want to contribute can bring recommended items, or make a donation.

For the month of January, 2024, Bethel has committed to assembling birthday cake kits for the Circle of Concern. Each kit will have one box of cake mix (any flavor), one can of Sprite soda, a can of icing and a package of birthday candles, along with a 9 x 13 inch baking pan. You can make as many kits as you would like, or you can donate \$5 for a child's gift bag.

For the month of February, we will ask for clothing and/or household items that can be donated to the New Life Evangelistic Center. They are always in need of winter coats and warm winter wear, and they accept used clothing.

Also in February, we will be honoring the Boy Scouts who are sponsored by Bethel Wildwood Church. The Open Door will publicize the Scout activities in our "Scout Corner" story.

As the year progresses, Bethel will be reaching out to help many other organizations: Newborns in Need, the Ronald McDonald House, the Girl Scouts April Showers drive, Equine Assisted Therapy, our local Fire Fighters and Police, the Gateway Alliance Against Child Trafficking, our Military and Soldiers, the Five Acres Animal Shelter, and more. We will continue our support for Circle of Concern with Thanksgiving baskets in November, and the holiday adoption program, and also the Mission Gate Christmas Angel Tree.

Bethel is also committed to the Highway 100 clean-up, which we do each quarter of the year. Mark and Alison Verbeck chair the project and will let us know the dates. We are also looking for someone to chair a Red Cross blood drive at our church. A date has not been set, but we will need volunteers and donors.

MONARCH BUTTERFLIES HAVE A FRIEND IN BARB JACOBS WHO RELEASED A RECORD

Monarch butterflies that happen to find their way into Barb Jacob's yard are lucky indeed. For the past nine years, Barb has been assisting these beautiful creatures to survive. She reached a milestone in 2023, by releasing a record 76 Monarch butterflies.

Barb recalls that in 2014, while tending her flower garden, she discovered the first chrysalis. She did some research and learned how people can assist butterflies during their first stages of life. Through the years, she has learned to search for the tiny yellowishgreen eggs that are placed on the underside leaves of milkweed plants by the female Monarch. The mother chooses a milkweed plant because that is the main food source for Monarchs. Barb moves the eggs into a protected enclosure and makes sure that there is an ample supply of milkweed plants there for the next



cycle. The brightly colored Monarch caterpillar emerges from the egg and eats exclusively on milkweed. As it grows, it molts several times, and reaches a length of almost two inches.



The next cycle is fascinating to watch, Barb says. She is always mesmerized by how quickly they make their chrysalis. "It takes only a minute," she says, and it is also amazing "how strong the silk thread is that holds the chrysalis." They hang in this stage for 10 to 14 days. *Then, the miracle happens*. The metamorphosis occurs and that chunky caterpillar is transformed into a butterfly. When the chrysalis becomes transparent in color, you know that the butterfly is ready to emerge. "It makes you wonder how they cram their wings inside the chrysalis," Barb says. She describes the body of the butterfly as plump with fluid and for the next several minutes, the butterfly will pump the fluid into the wings. The wings are

folded at first, and slowly begin to open. A mature Monarch butterfly wingspan can be four inches wide.

Barb watches carefully and when the butterfly is ready, she gently offers her hand, and it will cling to her finger. Then she lifts it to a flower. Eventually the Monarch butterfly, after being given a special name by Barb, will fly away. At times, when butterflies emerge so late in the year that flowers are not blooming, Barb has taken some of her butterflies to the Shaw Nature Preserve in Gray Summit to find flowers for them. One year, in October, she says, she had a friend transport a butterfly all the way to Florida.

Barb had a unique experience when she discovered three chrysalides that she identified as Eastern Black Swallowtail butterflies. The swallowtail does not migrate, so she wintered them in her garage over the winter, and she was able to release them the next spring.

Monarchs Migrate Each Year, All the Way to Mexico

The Monarch butterfly, with its strikingly beautiful orange and black wings, is likely the most recognizable butterfly in America. They seem so resilient as they float across our skies in summer and early fall months, and yet they face an uncertain future. With loss of habitat, the threat of pesticides and climate change, Monarchs have been listed as "vulnerable," but not on the endangered list. They definitely could use a helping hand from people willing to plant milkweed in their gardens.

Monarchs are unique in that they migrate for long distances each fall, leaving colder temperatures to winter in a warmer climate. Monarchs who live in the eastern half of Canada and the United States (which includes Missouri) travel all the way to Mexico. This can be a distance of nearly 3,000 miles. Scientists have noted that this is an incredible journey for a tiny creature that weighs about the same as a paperclip. Monarch populations who live west of the Rocky Mountains migrate to Southern California.

Most Monarchs have a short lifespan of only a few weeks. So, amazingly they produce one generation that lives for 8 to 9 months in order to accomplish this long journey. The migrating Monarchs use the position of the sun to guide them, but they also have an internal magnetic compass that helps them find their way in cloudy weather.

Barb has neighbors who share her passion for helping Monarch butterflies. She encourages others who would like to do the same. She recommends that everyone plant milkweed on their property, especially tropical milkweed which she says they seem to prefer.

Each year, Barb has named her butterflies before setting them on their journey. She knows how to identify male and female Monarchs, so she gives them appropriate names. In 2023, she said she went through the alphabet and back again. Next year she is planning to name them for characters from television shows. "You will see a Frazier and Miles..." she said with a smile.
